
A note from Pat:

HOW DID BETHEL'S BEAUTIFUL NEW BUILDING COME ABOUT? GOOD QUESTION!

On January 8, 2003, Bethel Presbyterian Church in Kingston, Tennessee embarked on an adventure called "A Season of Dreaming". This process assisted Bethel in developing a six-year mission plan. We discovered a clear Biblical understanding of vision and its role in the mission of the church. We also gained a clearer understanding of how mission relates to specific ministries and programs. But, most importantly, we developed a greater commitment to Bethel's vision and mission for the future.

The tangible result of this process was a new Vision Statement and plans for the future. Little did we know that once we came to recognize the sources of our congregation's unique character and inspirations, we would be faced with the challenge of TRANSFORMATION (spiritual and physical). Christ had something new to say to us and to the world!

After 190 years – we were so bold to ask "What was God's desire for us now?" I remember those first meetings of "A Season of Dreaming". It seemed to me (of course...Jerry and I had just moved to town), but from eyes that were not steeped in the wonderfully rich traditions of Bethel...we sensed there were some at Bethel who were somewhat



ambivalent about growth. Yet, all the people gathered together in this place we call Bethel truly desired what God desires – to reach out to our community and world with Christ's love and compassion. Without a doubt, growth would go hand in hand with that desire to move into the future. We were ready to move forward – but there were barriers blocking our path forward.

We tried to listen to Gods voice in one another, in structured demographic studies, supplemented by interviews with a full array of community leaders. We kept asking the question: "What are the needs of the community?" This process opened our hearts to our neighbors in a renewed way – allowing the needs of the community to break through.

I remember hearing of a man at Bethel who had a handicapped child and envisioned a school which became Michael Dunn Industries! Bethel was there to meet the needs of that ministry! And now we were hearing that folks wanted to insure that the strong presence of Christ through the ministry of Bethel Church would always be here in Kingston... even when they were gone!

We were painfully aware of the need to update our historic wooden structure (whose foundation was literally crumbling beneath us). There were physical barriers as well. The physical inaccessibility of our church was a hindrance to visitors and members as well. We actually had people visit that saw Bethel as a friendly and welcoming church but there

were many concerned with safety and accessibility issues.

During that "Season of Dreaming" it was obvious that we needed a safe church and facility with space for young and old, youth, Boy Scouts, Head Start and a place that could be open and welcoming to the community. A place where "unchurched" people in



our community would feel welcomed...a safe place for all.

God placed that dream in our hearts... and those dreams were put on paper...

Two successful building campaigns later... Construction began!

And our historic sanctuary was moved...

Which bring us to this day...and what is God doing in our midst!

In Katy Banker's wonderful book <u>A Church Called Bethel</u>, Katy wrote that the Bethel Church Session minutes of April 6, 1887 state: "It appearing that on Sabbath morning, the 27th day of March. 1887, that Bethel Church, which had been rebuilt on a new site, was rededicated by Rev. D. L. Lander, of Chattanooga, Tennessee..."

In June of 2008 the same sanctuary that was moved in the 1800's was successfully moved again onto her new basement and connected to the educational wing by an incredibly beautiful addition. This new multilevel narthex is truly a gathering place for all. The entire church is now accessible to everyone, with the addition of an elevator and handicap accessible restrooms. The whole church has been transformed – with the amazing union of the old historic sanctuary that was moved from Presbyterian Hill in the 1880's!

Because of a series of delays (which almost all construction projects have) we were not back into our church by Christmas of 2008 as hoped. The delays have made the target date for our first service March 22, 2009. With the formal re-rededication to be March 29, 2009 (120 years plus two days) from the last Bethel re-dedicated! It seems to me... quite providential!

An Introduction to Rent

Lent has begun – and we just celebrated its beginning the day before Ash Wednesday ("Fat Tuesday"). Fat Tuesday has developed into a time of "partying and carousing", exemplified by the extravagant celebration in New Orleans. Most people who celebrate Mardi Gras attach little or no religious significance to it. Yet, it is a time to prepare for the forty days of Lent, and to ponder the trials of Holy Week and to look forward to the joy of Christ's resurrection on Easter SEE The Presbyterian Worship Sourcebook (pages 551-552):

The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ are at the heart of the Christian gospel, and Good Friday and Easter are two of the most significant celebrations of the Christian year...Good Friday... filled with pain, grief and terror. Followed by a day filled with hope and grace! HOPE OUT OF CHAOS! Lent is a season of preparation and repentance during which we anticipate Good Friday and Easter.

Just as we carefully prepare for big events in our personal lives, such as a wedding or graduations, Lent invites us to make our hearts ready for remembering Jesus' passion and celebrating Jesus' glorious resurrection.

The practice of a forty-day preparation period began in the Christian church during the third and fourth centuries. The number *forty* carries biblical significance based on the forty years Israel spent in the wilderness and Jesus' forty-day fast in the wilderness.

The forty days of Lent begin on Ash Wednesday and continue through Holy Week, not counting Sundays (which are reserved for celebratory worship). In practice, many congregations choose to focus Sunday worship on the themes of repentance and renewal.

As a period of preparation, Lent has historically included the instruction of persons for baptism and profession of faith on Easter Sunday; the calling back of those who have become estranged from the church...and from God; and efforts by all Christians to deepen their devotion, and readiness to mark the death and resurrection of their Savior. So the primary focus of the season is to explore and deepen a "baptismal spirituality" that centers on our union with Christ rather than to function only as an extended meditation on Christ's suffering and death. The traditional color for the season is purple...as is signified with the changed paraments.

The Kingston United Methodist/Bethel Presbyterian Youth are planning a joint mission project this summer on the week of June 14-21st. The week will begin at New Smyrna Presbyterian Church in Conyers, Georgia. From Sunday through Thursday the youth will stay at this church that was originally built like our John Knox Center. They will stay in cabins and be taken to their job site by co-coordinators each morning after having a hot breakfast. There is an Olympic size pool and basketball and baseball areas to relax in at night after work. Lunch is sent to the job site with the workers and a hot supper is provided at night. Work consists of assisting the elderly of the community with home repairs. On Thursday, the youth will relocate to the United Methodist Children's Home in Macon, Georgia. This children's home was established in 1872 and has served over 10,000 children over the 135 years it has been in operation. 
