Dear Friends,

I love Fall. I love watching the leaves change to red, orange and yellow. I love driving by the lake each morning with the mist rising and the sun shining on the trees. It is magnificent and reminds me daily of God's great gifts to us – to all of us. That scene evokes praise for my Maker and thanksgiving for the reminders of God's generosity to us in creation, in beautiful moments, in life itself.

Indeed we worship and follow a Generous God. From the abundant gift of creation to manna in the wilderness, to hope in exile, to the gift of the incarnation itself. God is generous to us and all creation. The world and all that is in it belongs to God, says the psalmist and God graciously shares the world and all that is in it with us. As we give thanks in this month and season, we reflect on the goodness and blessings we have. We think more often this time of year about how much we do in fact have and offer gratitude to God. All that we have comes from God – there is no question about it.

So what do we do in the face of such amazing generosity - how do we respond to the gifts we are given? In answering that question, it serves us well to reflect on the meaning of generosity. Many of us may think simply about money – generous people are those who give of their financial resources. That is true and certainly a component of generosity. But it is more than that as well. Being generous is not just something we do it is something we are - a way of life. Being generous is a recognition that we have

all that we need for the life abundant and we can do nothing but share our gifts – be they gifts of money, of time, of talents, of attitude and spirit.

Indeed I have experienced great generosity from people who on the face had nothing. I took several groups to the border between Mexico and Texas to build cinder block houses for people who were living in cardboard and aluminum shacks. The Mexican folks knew how to mix mortar, how much to load on the tool and then put on the block. They knew how to measure for the window and the door. They knew how to install the rebar and even how to put that together. We knew practically nothing. And I quickly realized that though they could not build their houses without our money, they certainly could have built them more efficiently and more securely if they could have done it without us. Yet we would not have been changed nearly as much if we had not been there working across language barriers and skill barriers to help them build their houses. Those people had a generosity of spirit that was amazing and infectious.

Bethel Presbyterian Church too has a generous spirit. We recognize that we are able to do far more through God than we could ever imagine. As a whole, we know that being generous requires all of us: our time, talent and treasure. May we continue to cultivate and nurture a spirit of generosity among all of us so that we may continue to faithfully go where God leads and truly make a difference in our community and around the world.

Alternative Christmas Market Sunday, Nov 11 from 12:15 -3pm in the Fellowship Hall

The Alternative Christmas Market, is back. If you have forgotten what makes it alternative, well, the alternative piece is that all of the items for sale at this Christmas Market will be fairly traded, The coffee is grown and processed by a cooperative of farmers and marketed through churches, including the Presbyterian Church (USA) Coffee project. The olive wood handicrafts are made by Palestinian artists who are paid a fair wage for their product and marketed through PalCraft Aid, an organization of Christians dedicated to helping artisans make a living wage. So, the alternative piece is that everything for sale is made by a person who is paid fairly and given a stake in the business.

We have the opportunity at this market to buy beautiful and tasty Christmas gifts for our friends and family and to do so knowing that our purchases are contributing to a iust and sustainable future for the artisans and farmers who made/ grew the products. As Christians, we are called to seek justice for all people. Using our purchasing power at Christmas is a great way to do so - and it is a great opportunity to share the good news with others that we can buy fairly traded items and make the world a better place.

There will be something for everyone at this market so invite your friends and bring your checkbooks!

Dec. 2 at The Hanging of the Greens celebration here at Bethel.

These gifts give "food for the soul"- the hope of a brighter future and the reassurance that someone does indeed care about them.

Community Forum

The Roane State and Bethel University 2+2 Education program will host a Holocaust Forum on Thursday, November 1 at 4:30 pm at the RSCC Harriman Campus in room O-202.

The forum will include two speakers:

Ron Sternfels, RSCC Professor of Chemistry, will discuss his parents' escape from Nazi Germany. Sternfels' father escaped in 1933 at the establishment of the German fascist state, while his mother left throuh Italy in 1940 after the war began.

Arthur Pais was born in 1927 in Ukmerge, Lithuania. He and his family were forced to live in the Kovno Ghetto before deportation to Dachau in 1945. Pais endured the forced marching of Dachau victims in the face of the Russian invasion of Germany in February, 1945. Pais is participating in partnership with the Tennessee Holocaust Commission, which is located on the Vanderbilt University campus. The event is free and open to the public.


Fellowship
