#### Dear Friends,

There has been much talk in the media and around dinner tables to be sure about racism in the past few months. From Paula Deen's language choice to the Cheerio's commercial to the verdict in the George Zimmerman trial, we have been nudged into the conversation about race in this country again. It is ironic given that we have a President who has dark skin, but not unbelievable.

In the Brief Statement of Faith, we Presbyterians affirm our faith stating, "In sovereign love God created the world good and makes everyone equally in God's image, male and female, of every race and people to live as one community." Cleary we understand that racism - both individual and institutional – is contrary to God's vision for all of life. It is contrary to how we as Christians understand our calling to live with walls broken down, to

know that there is no longer Jew or Greek or slave or free or male or female but all are one in Christ Jesus our Lord. We know that racism is contrary to God's vision and our calling, and yet we see it rearing its ugly head again in these days.

All of us are made equally in the image of God. All of us are loved by God. For all of us God sent Jesus to show us another way - a more excellent way of love, justice and peace. As Christians we are called to live into the walls broken down by Jesus as we examine our own hearts for racism that crept in unconsciously and we are called to challenge racism wherever we see or hear it. Most importantly as Christians we are called to live without fear and to love all people, including those who may yet be blind to their own racism.

As a community of faith and as individual followers of Christ let us continue to seek justice, love kindness and walk humbly with God even as we speak out against racism both individual and institutional. This side of the fulfilled Kingdom, there is still work to be done, but each one of us by our words and deeds can make a difference – a positive difference here and now for all of God's children.

#### Bethel Equal Exchange Club

The Bethel Equal Exchange Club is a fair trade wholesale buying club originating with Bethel members. When you buy fair trade items you are using your voice to support safe social and environmental standards in the production of food. Fair trade purchases guarantee a just wage to the small farmer and support a sustainable and diverse food system throughout the world.

During our first order period of August 4 - 11 the club will offer coffee, tea, and olive oil by the case. You may order less than a case, but the club must order by the case. If we do not have enough orders to fill a case, the order will not be placed until someone adds to it to complete the case. A case is 6 units of coffee/tea or 12 bottles of olive oil. All orders are pre-sold at the wholesale prices. Neither the club nor the church makes any profit on the sales, but Equal Exchange will make small donations to the Presbyterian Hunger Ministry for each item sold through the club. Our next order period will be in October when we hope to offer chocolate.

Orders can be placed on Sundays- August 4<sup>th</sup> and August 11<sup>th</sup> – or by calling either Anita Richmond (865-376-1437) or Carol Brown (865-376-7171). And if you just want to ask a question, Anita or Carol will be glad to help you.

#### Triennium Report

Every three years, more than five thousand youth and adult volunteers attend an event known as Presbyterian Youth Triennium. This amazing experience lasts for several days and consists of daily worship services, bible study and discussion in small groups, and other activities ranging from drum circles and games to crafts and group storytelling. One night, we even watched a recent documentary in order to think about the ways in which we are all connected.

More than just a chance to get out of the house, Triennium forges lasting connections among youth who are travelling together from the same region and will meet again through service or similar retreats. The event is especially memorable because individuals from entirely different locations on the globe and completely unique perspectives have the opportunity to grow close as a small group. My small group covered bible passages such as Psalms 46:8, "Come, behold the works

of the Lord, what desolations he hath made in the earth," and John 10:18, "No man taketh it [my life] from me, but I lay it down of myself." We talked about the indefinable identity of God and how we could make a difference in the world. For me, the most meaningful part of Triennium was communion and worship on Thursday night. The verse that usually accompanies communion, "I am the Bread of Life," was read, but an undeniably uncommon sermon followed. We listened to three stories: graffiti as the documentation of a young boy and his journey, the dramatic naming of the multinational speaker, and finally the feeding of the five thousand. The feeding of the five thousand was particularly striking. Here we were, five thousand young people who had walked a long way from across campus and had gathered for worship on a huge hill. In the same way that the original five thousand listened to Jesus preach and then shared a meal together, our five thousand praised God with song before taking part in communion.

#### News from CASA

A Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) is a specially-trained volunteer, appointed by a juvenile court judge to advocate for the best interests of abused and neglected children. CASA volunteers receive a thorough screening and 30 hours of pre-service training before being assigned to a case by the judge. Once assigned, they interview all parties to the case in a quest to learn the circumstances and needs of the children. They report their findings and recommendations to the court and work with service providers to ensure that the children get the services they need.

Nationally, the CASA movement has a 35 year history of assisting the courts toward a goal of safe and permanent homes for all children. Locally, CASA volunteers have served the abused children of Roane County since 2001. They do good work. Hard work. Rewarding work. But their numbers are small and they can only serve a portion of the children whose cases come before the juvenile court. More volunteers are needed.

CASA volunteers make a difference. You can make a difference. The next training class is now being formed. For more information, email <a href="mailto:info@casaninth.org">info@casaninth.org</a> or call 865-717-4186.
