Session Highlights

There was no Session Meeting in June of 2022 Our Pastor Rev. Nancy Coleman tested positive for COVID

on June 23, 2022. She was at home resting. We could not find a PCUSA minister to moderate our 12:15 June 26 Session Meeting, so the meeting was canceled. What follows is just shared as information.

Worship Attendance: May 2022 average in-person Sanctuary attendance was 67 (from Sanctuary tablet) and the April 2022 average Facebook Worship attendance was 122.

On May 27, 2022 the Session approved by email (e-vote) up to \$4,000 to pay for the engagement of a CPA firm to complete the review of Bethel's 2021 financial records by "agreed upon procedure;" there was no one in-house to do the review.

An e-vote was approved by the Session on June 25, 2022 to purchase a new four drawer fire protection cabinet for the Bethel office. The current fire protection cabinet was purchased in 2002 (20 years old) and is still in excellent condition, but is at capacity. The office badly needs additional fire protection storage for important documents and permanent records.

Faith Team – Special music for summer Sundays is being coordinated by Judy Yeaworth.

For the May 27 Noontime Recital Series, 48 attended the event at Bethel to hear soprano Brenda Luggie perform a blend of story-telling pieces as well as folk melodies. Ms. Luggie is the July 2022

Choral Director and Associate Professor of Music at Roane State Community College. The performance was held at Bethel because of inclement weather at Southwest Point; Cake Lady Vicky Davis was brought indoors to serve delightful individually packaged cupcakes.

Finance Team – as of the end of May 2022, Bethel's Mortgage Loan Balance is \$299,389.

Study Team – The Study Team has started the summer session of Sunday School using the MarketPlace theme. The children and youth will come together to learn about life during Biblical times through Bible stories and crafts.

Family Promise

A quick look at the past year:

June 2021

- Hired new director, Greg Chadwick
- Had seven host congregations and four support churches
- Program available for 7 months of the year
- Began to develop new approach to serving families during and post COVID.

June 2022

- Added part time case manager to staff
- 12 host congregations and four support churches
- Serving families in two static sites: family of two at Bethel, one family of and one family of seven at Harriman United Methodist.
- One family of three 'graduated' to permanent housing.
- Helped several families avoid becoming homeless through prevention and intervention grant.
- Working with KUMC Clothes Closet to provide clothes and household goods to families.
- Was selected by KUMC Clothes Closet as one of their first charities to receive monies from their profits: approximately \$4,000 thus far.
- Received \$10,000 matching grant from Clayton Homes Grant Fund, of which over half of matching funds have already been raised.

Notes from Rev Nancy

Dear Friends,

I write this on day 5 with Covid 19; my mom and my husband are a couple of days behind me. Since all of our symptoms have so far been fairly mild, I have become even more appreciative of those who developed both the excellent vaccinations and the amazing treatments for this potentially life-threatening illness. I am also grateful to live in a place and a time where each of these is readily available.

As I prepare for preaching this coming Sunday (July 3) about Naaman the leper from 2 Kings 5. I am struck by both the similarities and the differences between his situation and the one in which we find ourselves today. While we may manage to fool ourselves that our global pandemic is over until our own or a loved one's diagnosis jerks us back to reality, Naaman was under no such illusions. He knew, and everyone around him knew, that leprosy was nothing to fool around with. For Naaman, a respected commander in the Syrian army, to have contracted the dread disease must have been a source of great shame to him, and-with treatment options virtually nonexistent-a cause of uncertainty and fear. No vaccines, monoclonal antibodies, or antiviral drugs were available for him or his loved one. So out of desperation, he listened to his Jewish slave girl as she advised him to go over

to Samaria to see the prophet Elisha, who would be able, she assured him, to cure him of his leprosy.

I suppose it is a part of human nature to be hesitant to put ourselves into the hands of so-called "experts"-or socalled "prophets"—especially when the treatment they recommend goes against what we've convinced ourselves is true. Naaman wanted a quick fix: appropriate words accompanied by the waving of the hand ... then voila, instant healing and a speedy trip back to his command post! And so, I suspect, do most of us. But God has different ideas. God had something for Naaman to do. Before healing could come, obedience was required.

For Naaman it was fairly simple, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times." For us it may be more difficult. "Go, call that person you haven't spoken to in over ten years." "Go, hang out with that teenager who needs a positive role model." "Go, give a listening ear to that difficult co-worker." Whatever is required for our own healing, may we be willing to take that first step. And so, may we be made whole.
