From the Pastor

In a sermon several weeks ago, I mentioned meditating on the gospel story of the lame man whose friends couldn't get him inside the door into the room where Jesus was and, instead, took him onto the roof, created a new entrance, lowered him to Jesus, there to receive forgiveness and healing. I likened the lame man's experience to mine -- the need I have for friends who can help bring me into TERIAN the healing aura of the divine presence. You are those friends, my friends! You have done that for me in such powerful ways – the healing service with laying on of hands last Sunday, encircled as I was by so many family, friends, church members, loved ones; the cross I now wear blessed by the youth and advisors who prayed for me during the Resurrection weekend; your own rituals and gestures of prayer and remembrance. And there are others in our community, too, who suffer or who face an uncertain future, who have felt the prayers of God's people in their own hour of need. Please, believe that the prayers of God's children - your prayers can lighten the load and help each of us find

From the outset of my diagnosis with Type C Thyanoma or cancer of the Thymus, my medical oncologists at Vanderbilt University Hospital and the Thompson Cancer Survival Center in Oak Ridge have diligently sought a cure for this rare, malignant cancer that has now begun to metastasize to various parts of my body. Through an amazingly delicate but successful procedure, I benefited from a throat surgery that enabled my vocal cords to recapture much of their sound-making quality that I feared had been permanently lost; through several chemotherapies and a bunch of radiation treatments, medical expertise has slowed the cancer's progress and given me the gift of many days. Further chemo and radiation therapies will likely be of a palliative, rather than curative, nature.

If my blood counts reach certain levels, I may qualify for a Phase One Clinical Trial at Vanderbilt. If that happens, medicines that have successfully been used to treat lab animals would be administered to me to help determine their human effectiveness. There

are still yet many unanswered questions if I should qualify for this clinical trial. And if this happens, I may need to call on various ones for transportation or other kinds of assistance.

I truly don't know what tomorrow holds, nor can I pretend to know the divine desire for my life and ministry, but I do covet assurance that you're in prayerful solidarity with me, and with that, a hopeful sense that we are never alone because of all

> we share as members together of Christian community.

I write all of this fully aware, just across the street, of the near completion of a dream and a project we've been praying for, planning, working on, and contributing to for so many months

and years it is so close that I can almost taste the food from the first church supper, hear the doxology being sung, feel the joy and laughter of friends being reunited, sense the release and blessing of a peace surpassing all understanding. Before too much longer

I would be the first to admit that it's sometimes hard to fathom the Almighty's mysterious ways in our midst; faith means to trust even when we don't have all the answers -- sometimes not even partial answers. But we do have one another, and we do have the power of Christian community and the hope that there will always be an overflowing measure of grace and mercy to sustain us and to carry us through the day and into the night. FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Aside from the inauguration, a major news story has been the salmonella outbreak caused by the peanut products traced back to Peanut Corp. in Blakely, Georgia. Tragically, the seventh person died this week from this freak event. Salmonella is more often associated with poultry products including eggs, than in peanut butter and plant products. The strain of salmonella involved has been identified as Salmonella Typhimurium, the most common of the more than 2, 500 types of salmonella bacteria in the United States. According to www.msn.com "Health & Fitness" the "recalled products range from cookie dough to candy and nutrition bars and also dog biscuits." The symptoms of salmonella are fever, diarrhea, cramping, and sometimes vomiting. These symptoms occur 12-24 hours after ingesting the contaminated food. Victims should seek medical help immediately as dehydration causes electrolyte imbalance.

Jars of peanut butter bought in grocery stores are fine. "Hershey, Kraft Foods and Girl Scouts USA are telling consumers their foods are not affected by the salmonella scare", reports the *New York Daily News* on Friday. CENTS-ABILITY NEWS:

Sometimes, Bethel's contributions to presbytery- or denomination-wide benevolences come nearly full circle, with that benevolence contributing in some way to a local agency. Such is the case with our participation in the PCUSA's Cents-Ability (formerly 2 cents-a-meal) program. In January, one of our favorite causes, Roane County Cooperative Ministries (RCCM), received a \$1000 check from the Presbytery of East Tennessee's Hunger Program (PETHP) that is funded thru Cents-Ability. RCCM will use the money this spring to fund their program of enabling over forty Roane County low-income families to obtain seeds, plants, and fertilizer to grow food in their own gardens. PETHP funds also recently flowed to the food pantry at Sunset Gap Community Center in Cosby and to other agencies in Lenoir City, Sweetwater, Oneida, Madisonville, Deer Lodge, La Follette, and Knoxville.


