Hello,

This month is going to be busy. We are engaging our Confirmation process for six young people. They will be studying church history, creeds, the Bible and also be reading the book, "Being Presbyterian in the Bible Belt: A Theological survival Guide for Youth, Parents, and Other Confused Presbyterians." It's a very interesting and entertaining read. We're planning on confirming them on Easter Sunday.

We are also engaging all of you in the development of our **Congregation Information** Profile with assessments, focus groups and conversations. I urge you to be involved with all of these activities as they are designed to help you think about where you want to go, why you want to go there, what you need to do to get there, how you're going to accomplish what you want to do, who is going to accomplish what, and when it's going to be accomplished.

My role, as your interim, is to help you make the transitions that need to take place: help you honor your past, celebrate your present, and create your future. We have to discern what God is calling us to be and to do. We also need to question what is our mission. Is it to serve those who are already being served? In tragedy, we see a sustaining faith that lifts us over troubled waters. Hope is what keeps us alive and keeps us ever challenging the future. Love is the glue that binds us together as the people of God

I urge all of you to be prayerfully mindful of what you are called to be as we journey into the future. Bethel has a destiny that will be determined by you and by the Holy Spirit.

From the Parish Nurse

If you are having allergies during the winter, don't feel alone. As cold weather makes us want to be inside with a roaring fire, allergens can become problematic. Smoke from the fireplace can irritate

nasal passages that are already dry from indoor heat. While humidifiers can be beneficial by adding moisture to the air, proper care must be taken so that bacteria and mold don't contribute to respiratory distress. Filters should be changed when mold appears and bactericide should be added to the water according to manufacturer's instructions.

Sometimes allergies are mistaken for colds. While colds last about a week, allergies may persist longer. Symptoms of winter allergies include itchy, watery eyes with a clear discharge seen from the nose. A sore throat might ensue because of increased nasal drainage down the back of the throat.

Dr. James Temprano, a St. Louis University allergist, offers these tips for winter allergies: Encase pillows, mattresses and

box springs with zippered allergen-proof covers.



Wash bedding once a week in hot water; dry on high heat. Keep pets out of bedrooms and other commonly used rooms. Use a vacuum cleaner with a high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter.

Wear a mask to cover the nose and mouth

when dusting or vacuuming.

Sometimes when folks encounter mold inside their home. they worry if this is a "bad' type of mold. The Environmental Protection Agency and the Center for Disease Control advise that any mold signifies a problem because some people may be allergic to that variety of mold. It is also an indication that unwanted moisture is present. The EPA and the CDC advise controlling unwanted water. removal of mold with a bleach and water solution. Make sure that you do not mix bleach with another cleanser as this can cause chemical pneumonia. Floors, walls and furniture saturated with mold may require disposal. Humidity levels in living spaces should be less than 50%.

What Are Some of the Terms of Our Mortgage?

_{Are} and ^f Finance

The trustees, authorized by the congregation, and the Presbytery of East Tennessee signed a one million dollar (\$1,000,000) promissory note with the Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program (PILP) on December 28, 2009. Some of the requirements of the note are:

Bethel Church is required to conduct a three-year capital cam-

paign by May of 2010, or our loan will be in default. The Capital Campaign Committee is working on how to implement this requirement. You will be hearing more about this in the coming months.

We are required "to apply any memorial gifts designated for the building fund to reduce the principal" of the loan. We currently have over \$19,000 in our Building Memorial Fund. This money will be used to reduce the amount we owe to PILP. Memorial funds that have been donated to specific areas of the building or to general memorials are not included in this requirement. We are required to obtain and maintain designated investments in the PILP of at least 20% of our outstanding loan balance. We currently have 21.82% from the Presbytery of East Tennessee

and other individuals who have purchased PILP notes and designated Bethel as the sponsoring organization. If we get around \$73,000 more, we will also get a .25% interest rebate. You can participate too. Investments can be as small as \$500. Your investment choices are a money market, fixed rate notes. and adjustable rate notes. Bethel will be notified you are participating, but will not be told how much you invested. To learn more, go to http://www.pcusa.org/ pilp/loans2.htm . Packets about the program are also available in the church office or you can contact Stewardship & Finance or the Trustees for more information. If you decide to participate, remember to designate Bethel Presbyterian in Kingston, TN as the church to receive credit for the investment.

Mission Trip News

Hopefully, you've heard by now that Bethel and KUMC are planning a joint, intergenerational mission trip to Ganado, Arizona on the Navajo reservation for the dates June 18 -27, 2010. We have had a few planning meetings so far, and will continue to do so (watch for announcements about meetings or contact Joe Coen). We are hoping that the trip will be a key ingredient in the "mission meal" that both churches consume this year. In that regard, we are hoping that everyone in both congregations will get behind the effort, whether attending the trip or not.

We are planning for a few engagement sessions with both congregations for the last Sunday in February, March, and April. There will be a light lunch after Worship followed by a talk or other program aimed at furthering our understanding of who we'll meet, why we are going, what to expect, what not to expect, etc. So, join us on those days (again, whether or not you are planning to attend the actual trip in the summer).

If you are thinking of attending the summer trip, here are a few thoughts to consider:

We think the total cost per person will be about \$400. This amount includes a small amount of spending money and does not yet take into account the fact that we may have some funds available to offset the cost (which would cause your cost to go down).

We'll have at least two kinds of service opportunities available in order to suit folks of all sizes, shapes, and skills: construction / maintenance activities, organized by Jim Schall, such as building bunk beds; and an engagement with a large group (we're hoping of 50 or more) of local children and youth in a bible-school-like arrangement led by Regina Little.

We'll fly out there and back from Nashville.

We'll need a firm commitment and a substantial down payment by about the end of March, with full payment needed by the end of May.



New Childhood Vaccines Schedules Released

Healthday Reporter – Mon Jan 4, 11:49 pm ET (HealthDay News) Boys should get the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine to protect them against genital warts, and all children should receive the H1N1 vaccine to guard against swine flu, according to updated guidelines on childhood and teen vaccines.

The new vaccine schedules -- issued by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the American Academy of Family Physicians -- also recommend using combination vaccines whenever possible.

"These are life-threatening illness that vaccines prevent, and if you have a combination vaccine that's safe and effective and requires one less stick for your child and one less trip to the doctor, it makes sense to me -- as a f father -- to think about that," said Dr. David W. Kimberlin, a professor of pediatrics and codirector of the division of pediatric infectious diseases at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Kimberlin is a member of the committee that created the new immunization schedules.



The new vaccine schedules are published in the January issue of *Pediatrics* and online on Jan. 4. The most significant changes are:

• A recommendation that children older than 6 months receive the H1N1 influenza vaccine.

- A newly licensed HPV vaccine for girls, known as HPV2, to protect them from cervical cancer, which can be caused by certain strains of HPV. Girls should get their first dose of either the HPV2 or the earlier HPV4 vaccine, which is still considered effective, around age 11 or 12.
- A suggestion that a threedose series of the HPV4 vaccine can be given to boys between 9 and 18 years old to prevent genital warts.
- A statement that the use of combination vaccines are generally preferred over separate injections.

The need to revaccinate some high-risk children who have already received the meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV4). Kids at high risk tend to be those with immune system disorders. Booster shots aren't recommended for those whose only risk factor is living in a dormitory setting, according to the new vaccine schedules.
