FROM THE PASTOR

The arrival of Epiphany on January 6, 2009 – the holy day commemorating the visitation of the non-Jewish magi to the Christ child and thus the message of redemptive hope given to all the nations – reminds me that it was this liturgical red letter day that occasioned my very first sermon, "Star Seekers and Christ Finders," at Kingston United Methodist early in 2008. The journey of these exotic travelers to Bethle-

hem can offer each of us a lesson about how the Christian life means traveling by the map of faith, moving towards that which can never be fully comprehended, only sought after again and again, for in the act of seeking is the finding.

Although we had anticipated returning to Bethel by now and to those two old building made wonderfully, almost magically, into one, we are glad that the time of return can now be measured in weeks instead of months. Meanwhile, as we wait,

we have good news to share on several fronts. The session recently named the church library the E. John and Doris M. Barber Library, in memory and honor of this couple whose devotion to God and to the work of the Church has meant so much to the Bethel congregation over the years. The Barber family has set up a fund for gifts to honor this couple. A similar recognition of the new kitchen will be made soon, mindful of Joyce and Vernon Law and all they have meant to this church family over the years. As we seek to furnish and equip various rooms and all the Sunday School spaces, the cost of which is outside the building contract of 1.7 million dollars, please let me or a session member know if you'd like to participate in memorializing one of these areas. Steve Jacks and Margaret Murr are working on a memorial book that will be prominently displayed to recognize the many gifts that have enabled Bethel to get to this juncture in our history; you may want to share your ideas with one of them. As items on the ever-shortening list of finishing touches continue to be checked off, a major step affecting our move back involves certification by the inspector that the building is ready for occupancy. This, in large part, will hinge on paving, thus

ensuring safety for all. Pray for some sunny weather!

I'd personally like to thank each and everyone for your patience and financial generosity in making this tremendous, huge project possible. Such generosity has come at a difficult time given the downturn in the economy; moreover, I give thanks that the initial word is that our support in 2008 of the regular, ongoing work of the church kept pace with expenditures and that we did not have to dip into reserves.

Hallelujah! That's, indeed, cause for great rejoicing, considering displacement from our facility, a decline in attendance, and the continuation of most all of the usual costs for the mission and ministry of the church. Prior to December, about \$140,000 in building fund pledges were still outstanding, with about \$10,000 of that received by the end of the year. Our monthly mortgage payments are now a major financial focus, so any pledge you can make to lower that amount will

be most welcome.

On a personal note, I am receiving additional radiation to my chest to try and relieve some of the acute pain recently experienced. You know the appreciation I feel for your prayers throughout my illness, and I hope that we, as a faith community, can offer similar support and encouragement to anyone in our community who suffers. Please join me in trusting that, soon, the clouds and fog will give way to spring and resurrection!

FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Happy 2009 to everyone. One of the most commonly-made New Year's resolutions each year is one to lose weight. It is one that is equally hard and frustrating to keep. In November 2008 I was diagnosed with

diabetes type II and told that I had to lose weight. There was no New Year's resolution for me, this was the real deal. I am a self-proclaimed sweet-a holic. Those were the first to go out of the pantry. Next, were the starches....I still wince when I think of giving up my good ol' yeast rolls and pasta. You see, starches break down in the body into sugar. For those of you who do not have problems with sweets, but still want to lose weight; I read an article that you might be interested in @ MSN Health and Fitness com.

Once you make up your mind to lose weight make a short term goal. For instance, a good goal would be two pounds lost in 2 weeks' time. After you reach your goal, start over with another goal that is attainable.

If the reason for your diet is cosmetic, a lot of times you will find a way to weasel out of it. "Jeff Volek, PhD., R.D., of the University of Connecticut, suggests keeping a daily journal in which one would monitor migraines, heartburn, acne, canker sores and sleep quality in additions to body measurements." (From MSN Health and Fitness.com). What happens if you goof up and overindulge? Forgive yourself...everyone does that now and again. The important thing is to start again and reestablish your healthy eating pattern. Remember to eat 3-5 healthy meals and snacks and you have started your "habit" again.

It is very important to eat breakfast in the morning after your body has had nothing to eat for 6-8 hours. Otherwise, by the time you get to work you are more likely to grab that sugary doughnut or other snack food.

At home, make it easy on yourself to succeed. Empty your pantry of the foods that are going to make you fail on your diet and stock it with the things that will make you win. Some good things to stock in your cupboard and fridge are: almonds and other nuts, cheese, fruits and vegetables, canned tuna, chicken and salmon. You can pack your lunch to take to work or make sure you have some healthy choices available to you at work.

In the grocery isle the packaging can be very deceiving. Just because the item says "all natural" and made with "organic cane juice"; it is still sugar. Just as if it said pure cane sugar. The same is true with honey- it breaks down to sugar too.

When you have a craving for sweets even though you ate only a few hours ago; are you really hungry, or are you bored? If you are really hungry, think "Would I like another meal?" If the answer is no, get up and move around and go for a walk or get your mind on something else.

Since November I have lost 45 pounds. And yes, I still dream of Shoney's hot fudge cake! (We all have our cross to bearJ). I wish all of you a very happy and prosperous New Year.

ing Him. Bethel has a long history of ministry in the Morgan County Correctional Complex. The reflections below are the thoughts of one of the inmates with whom we have worked:

"Bethel Presbyterian Church has been instrumental in helping prisoners at Morgan County Correctional Complex for many years. As long as I can remember, volunteers from Bethel have participated in church services, picture taking projects, rehabilitative programs, club banquets, scholarships, Christmas packages and many other projects that escape me at this moment. When no one else will help, and it seems that the world is against us, Bethel stands as a light of Christ's love in an otherwise desolate and lonely place.

"Bethel volunteers are more than simply people who help inmates—they are family and friends. Many of us "old heads" around here look forward to the services and other visits from Bethel members because we know we will be treated with respect, compassion, and friendliness. When many churches show up, preach a message calling on us to repent of our sins, and leave seeming smug in their accomplishment, Bethel volunteers exude the demeanor that assures us they do not think themselves better than us, but are fellow travelers on the same road home. This example is what draws many to the church services every fifth Sunday.

"I have been incarcerated for fifteen years and the community that I belong to provides me a sense of normalcy and accountability. Bethel is a large part of this community and an intricate part of our rehabilitation. Space and time prohibit me from sharing the many times Bethel has come to our aid, the many encouragements we receive from the members of Bethel, and the impact all of you have had on our lives that will last for eternity. On behalf of the prisoners here, I would like to say thank you and encourage others to take up the task of ministry to a forgotten people." —Jeremy Ingram

STEWARDSHIP & FINANCE

We haven't finalized the numbers for 2008, but here is some preliminary information on how we fared this past year:

Even though our budget income was 15% less than

we had planned, we ended the year with only a \$7,000 loss thanks to wise spending on the part of staff and committees.

This year we gave \$27,000 to specific missions identified by Bethel and \$30,000 to the PC(USA) ministries and missions.



Our General (Budget) Fund has \$5,000 more than

required for starting the new year. We always keep \$40,000 as an extreme emergency fund and try to start the year with \$20,000 for budgeted expenses. Initial figures tell us we have \$65,000 in the General Fund.

In December we received almost \$19,000 in building fund pledges. Our pledges receivable are about \$120,000. We have received 90% of the original 3 year pledge amounts.

We have pledges for about half of our estimated monthly mortgage payment. If you would like to commit to a monthly amount to help pay the mortgage payment, please send a note to the Bethel Office, attention Stewardship & Finance.

Remember, these numbers are not final. A complete reporting will be presented at the annual congregational meeting in January. Finally, each of you deserves a big THANK YOU for the support you give to Bethel's ministries.

the mess left by Hurricane Ike but we're also looking to send a team or teams back to the Gulf Bay St. Louis area where there is still major rebuilding work needed. Once 6-10 people express interest we will develop the time, place, cost and details of such a trip.

We have contacts with numerous skilled leaders plus a wonderful relationship with a church in Bay St. Louis that has developed a facility capable of housing many people.


A HYMN FOR THE NEW YEAR
