FROM THE PARISH NURSE

For those of us bothered by any form of arthritis, winter weather

can be tough. Have you ever noticed that in the morning or after sitting in one position for a while that your joints are stiff? Have you ever wondered why? While doing my research for this article, I read a publication by Dr. Mark S. Lachs, director of the Center for Aging Research and Clinical Care at the Weill Medical College of Cornell University. Apparently there are quite a few reasons our joints stiffen with inactivity; I will address two of them. Age-related changes in joint cartilage, combined with a decrease in the amount of lubricating joint fluid it produces, causes osteoarthritis and the stiffness it engenders. While we sleep or sit

spread unevenly in the joint space. When we stand up, the cartilage surfaces at first rub against each other without ideal lubrication. As activity

continues and lubrication improves, the structures glide with less friction. As I think of this "oiling of the joints", it reminds me of the *Wizard of Oz* where the tin man has rusted and needs his rusty joints oiled to help him move again.

Another factor is changes in bone architecture as we age. When we are babies, supporting structures like ligaments, tendons and the muscles attached to joints are relaxed and flexible. Aging causes these structures to be less *fluid* (all puns intended). Sitting for long periods keeps ligaments, tendon and muscles maximally contracted, but as the day wears on, the stretching associ-

ated with normal activity or exercise can provide some relief. Speaking of exercise, this is very good to keep you limber. The Arthritis Foundation recommends regular exercise to those affected by arthritis. Three good forms of exercise are swimming and aquatic exercise, Tai Chi and walking. Water exercise provides movement while not placing too much weight on any one joint. Tai Chi consists of a number of slow, easy movements for all ages. I will do a "plug" here and remind everyone that Julie Bunch leads Tai Chi classes if you would like to become involved, please call Julie. The third type of exercise is walking....its free and the lake provides some great scenery to keep

MISSION OUTREACH Christmas Baskets and Angel Tree

This has been the best year ever for this project. Through the generous contributions of produce from many of you this summer and early fall and the purchasing of this produce by others of you, through donations and purchases from the plant and bake sale and through the purchase of the generous contribution by Viviana of various items from Guatemala and your purchases of these items as well as the contributions of food and money, the Mission Outreach Committee was able to supply very generous baskets of food to 35 families and 7 elderly people. Not only did these baskets provide food for a very nice Christmas dinner but also enough food for several days since many of

the families have children out of school for two weeks or more.

As always, your generosity as sponsors for angels gave 55 children a Christmas this year. I know, since I helped take applications, that many of these families have never had to ask for help before. Jean Dice knitted more than 50 hats, which along with other knitted hats were put into each of the children's baskets as well as those for the elderly. nating and procuring food for the baskets. Teresa Hettrick worked with Piggly Wiggly to get food and boxes. Joan Davis provided an excellent breakfast for those of us early birds who came in to help distribute baskets Saturday morning. Vernon Law and Pat Hale spent much of the day Friday picking up food and anything else we needed as well as helping Saturday. And special thanks to Ruth Ann Ludwig for helping me sort and organize the gifts.

Stewardship and Finance

Thanks to all the people who responded to the fall stewardship "Step Up" campaign! Forty folks signed up to work with committees in the coming year. In addition, we know that there were individual sign ups at many of the committee booths during the Stewardship Fair. Committees are the life blood of the church. If you are interested in doing something and don't know who to contact, grab someone and ask or call the church office (376-6340).

We received 26 general fund commitments which totaled almost \$8,000 per month. Ninety-two other families have contributed to the General Fund this year an average of \$9,000 / month. Cash offerings average \$543 / month. We project General Fund offerings in 2010 to be \$200,000

We think we are still \$600 a month short to meet the mortgage payments of \$8,350. We have 16 commitments toward mortgage payments for \$3,298 / month, a 37% increase for those families who contributed in 2009. Forty four other families have been making regular contributions that average \$4,453 for a total projected mortgage offering of \$7,751.

Remember to wait to file your income tax until you receive your

contribution statements from the church. We hope to have them out by the middle of the month.

Landscape Committee

Things continue to happen in the Bethel landscape. ReCal Nursery planted three large sugar maples the second week of December. These trees were donated by Ruth Ann Ludwig in memory of Bob Ludwig and by Ken Dungan in memory of Henry Tulley and Tom Roostee. Three birdhouses are now in place. Many thanks to Danny Holloway for digging the holes.

We also thank the city for planting two redbuds in the labyrinth area. Many thanks go to Joni Morgan for donating the bench in the Memorial Garden.

Many of the annuals and perennials have been donated by Williams Greenhouses in Harriman. As you get ready to purchase your flowers this spring and summer, please remember the generosity of this local business and consider making your purchases from them.

Bethel Tresbyterian Church Memorial Garden

Bethel Presbyterian Church is in its final phase of the construction of the Memorial Garden, which is located on the sloped hill below the main entrance on the Sanctuary level. The Memorial Garden was established for the interment of ashes of members (past and present) of Bethel Presbyterian Church and their immediate families, friends of the Church who have been part of the congregation, and pastors (including former clergy) of the Bethel Presbyterian Church and their immediate families. Ashes will be buried in linen bags in assigned plots. The location of occupied or reserved plots will be kept in the Church Office. The names of persons interred in the Garden, and individuals requesting to be memorialized, will be inscribed on a granite monument, which will soon be installed inside the Memorial Garden.
