## What is Lent?

Lent is a 40 day period before Easter that commemorates the time Jesus spent in the wilderness. In the early church this was a time of preparation for those about to be baptized. Today it is more often regarded as a season of soul searching and repentance for all Christians when we prepare for the joy and celebration of Easter by giving ourselves an annual spiritual check up. It begins with Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Maundy Thursday. You probably realize that there are more than 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Holy Thursday. That is because early Christians never fasted on Sundays. They are excluded from the days of Lent because they are always celebrations of Christ's resurrection.

The temptations of Christ parallel those of the children of Israel in the wilderness but how different are his responses. The children of Israel were dissatisfied with God's provision of manna. They remembered the rich foods from their captivity in Egypt and greedily hungered for more so that their physical cravings could be satisfied. (Num 11:4-36) Christ saw his physical hunger as unimportant and trusted in God to provide for all his needs.

At Massah, the Israelites demanded miraculous signs that revealed God's presence, totally ignoring God's constant and miraculous care for them. (Ex 17:1-7). Jesus refused to test God by the use of miraculous signs. The Israelites fashioned a golden calf

to worship but Christ turned his back on temptations of worldly wealth and power.

Each time he is tempted by Satan, Christ deliberately turned away from the attractions of a self centered and self serving world in order to place God's purposes and the outwardly focused values of God's kingdom at the center of all he was and did.

Lent is a time when we reflect on our behaviors and seek help in rededicating ourselves to God's purposes. It is a time for self-denial and fasting when we give up some of the comforts of our lives in order to make ourselves more available to God.

Traditionally, Lent is marked by penitential prayer, fasting, and giving. Most churches that observe Lent at all focus on it as a time of prayer, especially penance, repenting for failures and sin as a way to focus on the need for God's grace. It is really a preparation to celebrate God's marvelous redemption at Easter, and the resurrected life that we live, and hope for, as Christians.

During Lent it is as though we join Jesus in his walk toward Good Friday and the crucifixion. Our self denial is a way to enter into the fellowship of Christ's suffering so that we can identify more fully with those who are chronically hungry, oppressed, in pain or in need. This year as we walk towards the Cross may we invite God to make us aware of those things that distract us from a wholehearted commitment. Let us be open to the ways of the spirit.

Last Thursday I was part of a PCUSA webinar regarding Haiti and what the PCUSA is doing. I wanted to take this time to bring you up to date. The latest statistics show that there are 250,000 dead as the result of the earthquake and 1 million left homeless. Water and sewage disposal systems have been destroyed. 1,000 have had amputations secondary to their injuries. There are approximately 700 children orphaned and many unaccompanied children. The impact of the earthquake on their agriculture is enormous...their main crop is rice which must have a lot of water.

What has PCUSA done? Through One Great Hour of Sharing- \$100,000 has been given to support World Church Service that acts in response to the local's needs. Holy Cross Hospital and school of nursing were destroyed by the earthquake. To date, PCUSA through PDA (Presbyterian Disaster Assistance) has given \$ 1/2 million to help rebuild the hospital and school of nursing. Most of the population is living in

tents made only of tarps strung together. The job is not going to get easier. In fact, officials fear the coming months when Haiti will face its rainy season with the threat of storms, floods and hurricanes.

Right now, trauma counselors fluent in French or Creole are the main need.

Children can make the Hygiene kits and gift of the heart kits or have a fundraiser to benefit Haiti.

Are the adults to go on a work-trip to Haiti? Not yet....officials say that we don't know all the needs and exactly what we can do.

### *From the Parish Nurse*

My pal Joni Morgan recently sent me an email that got me thinking about Lent. I grew up in the Church of Christ in Rockwood. Needless to say, we did not observe Lent. When I started going to Bethel in 1989, I started learning many new traditions. I learned that Lent is the forty days between Ash Wednesday and Easter. Interestingly, these forty days do not include Sundays because Sundays are "Feast Days" that we do not fast. The traditional purpose of Lent is the preparation of all believers-through prayer, penitence, almsgiving and self-denial- for the annual commemoration during Holy Week of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus that culminates in Easter. Easter is the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Why forty days? There are numerous Biblical accounts to reflect upon: the forty days Moses spent on Mount Sinai with God (Exodus 24:18), the forty days and nights Elijah spent walking to Mount Horeb (1Kings 19:8), God made it rain for forty days and forty nights in the days of Noah (Genesis 7:4), the Hebrew people wandered forty years traveling to the Promised Land (Numbers 14:33), Jonah in his prophecy of judgment gave the city of Nineveh forty days in which to repent (Jonah 3: 4). In the New Testament, Jesus retreated into the wilderness, where he fasted for forty days, and was tempted by the devil (Matthew 4: 1-2, Mark 1: 12-13, Luke 4: 1-2). As we will recall, Jesus overcame all three of the devil's temptations by reciting scripture back to him. After these forty days in the wilderness, the

angels fed Jesus and he started his ministry. In my research for this article, I found out that it is a traditional belief that Jesus lay for forty hours in the tomb and that this led to the forty hours of total fast that preceded the Easter celebration in the early church.

Many decide to "give something up" for Lent. This self-denial can be food (chocolate, alcohol, red meat) or an activity (going to the movies, playing video games) or we can consider taking on a Lenten discipline such as devotions, volunteering for charity work, etc. Danny and I are giving up chocolate. I tend to look on the bright side.....this is only for forty days and Sundays are not included in this sacrifice.

I wish you a healthy, introspective Lenten season

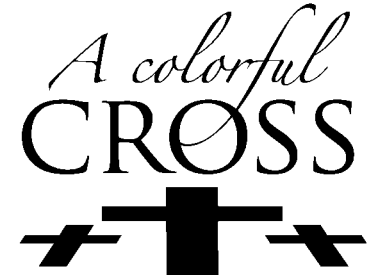

## Just for kids...



Create a beautiful decoration for your window this Easter. It will remind you that Jesus rose from the dead to save you from your sins.

### What you need:

- 8½" x 11" sheet of paper
- Pencil
- Clear transparency sheet (or clear report cover)
- Permanent marker
- Scissors
- Colored tissue paper
- Paintbrush
- Glue
- Scotch tape

### What you do:

1. Draw a large cross that takes up most of the paper.
2. Put the transparency over the paper and trace the cross onto it with a permanent marker.
3. Cut the colored tissue paper into 1" x 1" squares.
4. Using a paintbrush, spread glue onto the tissue paper squares and then place them on the cross. (Add a few drops of water to the white glue to make it more spreadable.)
5. After the glue is dry, cut out the cross. Then tape it in a window and enjoy the beautiful colors.

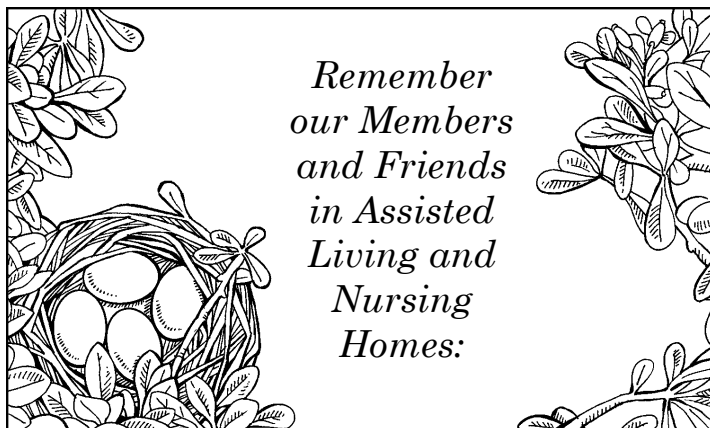
