From the Earish Kurse

This month I found a good article from *MSN Health & Fitness* Called "The Worst Drive – Through Foods in America". It is not surprising to me that we find ourselves stopping more and more frequently at a fast food restaurant rather than cooking at home.

Our lives seem to get more hectic every day. The last thing we want to do is go home and cook and then



clean up the dishes. I sympathize.

The worst drink can be found at our own Sonic. It is the Sonic

Minute Maid Cranberry Juice Slush (Route 44) with 616 calories and 165 grams of sugars. Usually antioxidant-packed cranberry juice is a healthy choice. However, the cranberry part is 78 calories out of the 616. "Slush"-- consider that another word for frozen sugar water. A better alternative would be a has 42 calories and 10 grams of sugar.

According to the MSN article, the highest fat Mexican entrée can be found at Taco Bell. The grilled "Stuft Beef" burrito has 680 calories, 30 grams of fat (10 grams of saturated fat) and 2,120 mg. of sodium. A better choice would be two grilled steak soft tacos, fresco style. Fresco style means that the cheese and the sauces will be replaced with a chunky tomato sauce, helping to cut the calories in half and the fat by at least twenty- five

percent. The two grilled steak soft tacos, fresco style, have 320 calories, 9 grams of fat (3 grams saturated fat) and 1,100 mg. sodium.

The worst hot sandwich was Hardee's big chicken filet sandwich with 800 calories, 37 grams of fat (6 grams saturated fat), and 1,890 mg. of sodium. You would think that chicken would be the correct choice, wouldn't you? The operative word here is BIG—stay away from items that say BIG and MONSTER, etc. Hardee's charbroiled bbq chicken sandwich is much better for you at: 415 calories, 5 grams fat (1 gram saturated fat), and 1,175 mg. sodium.

Plant a Row for the Hungry this Growing Geason

Did you know that East Tennessee emergency food distribution agencies recently estimated that in Roane, Anderson and Morgan Counties alone:


- More than 29,000 people are at risk of hunger
- Between 14.32 and 17.52 % of these populations live below the poverty line
- Over 600,000 meals were distributed in these counties last year
- More than 6,000 requests for food assistance are filled each month The need is great and growing.

The emergency food distribution network (Soup kitchens, etc...) does a tremendous job day in and day out of feeding hungry families in East Tennessee. However, they are facing unprecedented demand for their assistance. As we continue through these tough economic times, high unemployment rates, and other hardships such as nature disasters, there is a greater need not only to feed the hun-

gry, but to provide fresh produce into that diet to supplement the often less healthful cheaper prepared food stocks.

The purpose of the Plant a Row (PAR) campaign is to create and sustain a grassroots program to encourage citizens who garden, to donate their surplus garden produce to the local emergency food distribution network. The concept is simple -- if every gardener plants one extra row of produce and donates their surplus into the local

emergency food distribution network, a significant impact can be made on reducing hunger. When this network has access to more fresh produce, funds earmarked for produce can



The Master Gardeners of Roane County, as an organization, believe we can help make a difference by helping provide nutritional fresh produce for those who are struggling in East Tennessee. Since Bethel has reopened its doors, four new families have joined the church. This month, we would like to introduce two of these families:


