FROM THE PASTOR

If you haven't done so already, I hope you will take an opportunity to tour Bethel's new building project after church on September 7, a tour that members of the Design and Development Team will lead. We continue to be indebted to Gary Griffith, Ken Dungan and all the outstanding members of this Team who have spent countless hours pouring over details and ensuring nothing less than excellence in the completion of the project.

Many of you are asking – "When will we get back into Bethel?" I can report, if all goes well, that we are on schedule to return by this coming Thanksgiving! When Gary took us over onto the new second floor after last week's Wednesday night supper, I was truly astounded by the progress as well as the incredible size of the new spaces we will have at our disposal – the offices, gathering spaces, and expanded fellowship hall, for instance, are much larger than I had imagined from simply studying the architect's plans. While I have been observing daily progress from just outside the construction zone, seeing the new structure "up close and personal" made me realize anew just how blessed we are that God has asked us to further the ministry of Christ and the Church in this fashion.

It is not every congregation that has the resources, vision, and faith to make a project of this magnitude go forward, and every member and friend of Bethel Presbyterian should thank God for this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. Not only have we had many "wows!" and "amazings!" from folks in the larger Kingston community, but quite a few of our own members have commented about the way the new design retains the best of the old while meeting the needs of a $21^{\rm st}$ Century congregation. Like many things in life and faith, first-hand looks and personal experience are far more convincing and gratifying than second-hand reports, so please stop by and see how far we've come.

One of the unanticipated blessings of this whole experience is the vibrant witness to oneness in the body of Christ that we and our Methodist friends have offered to Kingston and Roane County. Bethel's Session currently exploring ways to continue this partnership beyond the time of our return, and we welcome your suggestions about how we can share in a common call to ministry and service. If you have ideas you'd like for us to pursue, contact elders Joe Coen, Carol Brown, Julie Bunch, or myself; there is a similar team of folks from Kingston United Methodist discussing this partnership. We appreciate your prayers as we address a number of very important issues in the coming months and as we build on the foundation of Bethel's 190 years of worship and witness.

FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Happy September! This month I have chosen a

topic that has been in the newspapers quite a bit lately. Unfortunately, it is a subject that is once again putting Roane County in the crime spotlight. What is Methamphetamine? RNmagazine states in its May 2008 issue: "It is a federal Drug Enforcement Administration schedule II drug, which



means it has a safe and accepted medical use. Methamphetamine, or Meth, is a psychostimulant used to treat attention-deficit disorder, narcolepsy and morbid obesity." For a lot of people meth is the street drug of choice because it is less expensive and has longer-lasting effects than crack cocaine.

In researching this fascinating drug, I found that Meth had been used in the 1930's as an additive to nasal decongestives and bronchial inhalers for the treatment of bronchial asthma. In the 40's the War Department used Meth as a stimulant to keep soldiers and pilots alert and combat ready. In the 1950's Methamphetamine was used to treat alcoholism, Parkinson's disease and depression.

In today's society this drug has taken on a new notoriety because it is cheap, and relatively easy to make. Therein lays the double edged sword: Recreational use can lead to addiction after only a single dose, if the dose is high enough. Use alters the user's physical appearance markedly within a short amount of time. The addicted person feels a sensation like bugs crawling on their skin and they will scratch their skin incessantly leaving tell-tale scabs or scars or their bodies where they scratch. In addition, the lithium, lye, and ammonia needed to make Meth causes dental caries so the addict's gums bleed and teeth rot. Oh, and did I mention that they use brake fluid, antifreeze and paint thinner in the manufacture of this drug? I am surprised more people in Roane County are not killed by Meth or in Meth labs. Once a lab is discovered and shut down it is virtually uninhabitable again as the chemicals permeate building materials and state law requires assessment and clean-up of contaminated sites, and the deed must be changed to reflect that a Meth lab once existed on the property. 5 MINUTE CHOCOLATE MUG CAKE

The value of the building based on insurance appraisal is \$1,339,000. Since the building is not yet complete, its value is not shown in the numbers above to give a more accurate picture of where we stand financially. We will be making draws from our construction loan very soon.

As our building project progresses, we can now visualize what it will look like when it is completed. We will have a place to worship that maintains the old, familiar atmosphere while adding some new features that will make it easier for some of the older or less agile members to come be a part of our worship services. Joining the congregation at the Methodist Church has been a pleasure and they have made us all feel very much a part of their church lives, but we are all looking forward to moving "home".

We have now begun the loan portion of our financing and are starting to make monthly payments to the Presbytery and the bank. Many of you indicated that you would be willing to make monthly contributions to the building fund in addition to your regular giving to help cover the expense of these loan payments; several of you are already doing so. We realize that things are financially challenging for most of us at this time, but we wanted to let you know that payments are now being made and ask you to give as you are able.

Please keep us in your prayers as we work to manage the financial responsibilities not only of the building project but also of the day to day activities of the church. Thank you for all that you do for Bethel, the community and each other.

God's Creation

You can easily spot God's beautiful creation not just in majestic mountains and vast oceans but also in the smallest bits of nature. Try this fun activity at a park, in your backyard or on a hike.


What you need:

- · Paper
- Pencils, pens or crayons
- · Plastic cups or bowls

What you do:

- 1. Write out the same list of items for each player. One person can do this ahead of time, or the group can determine what to hunt for. Items must be small enough to fit in the container provided. Suggestions include: flower, grain of sand or dirt, seed, blade of grass, feather, small stick, pebble, insect (preferably alive), leaf, thorn, berry and so on.
- 2. Give a list and a cup (or bowl) to each player.
- 3. Designate a place to search for items, as well as a time limit (for example, look in the backyard for 15 minutes).
- During the scavenger hunt, enjoy seeing the beauty of God's creation in the tiniest things. Players should cross off items when found.
- 5. When time is up, compare items. Point out similarities and differences. Discuss why these items are so amazing. Share Bible verses or stories about some items (for example, Isaiah 40:8 talks about grass and flowers, 1 Corinthians 10:4 talks about Jesus' being our rock, etc.).
